Solar Co-Op Begins Panel Installations

With the assistance of Solar United Neighbors, the Indiana Solar Co-Op selected Groundhog Solar LLC to install solar panels within the Co-Op and held open sign-ups for the event until April 26, 2019. With a successful turnout, there were 61 new signups for the Indiana Co-Op with homes deemed eligible for producing solar energy. There are 12 signed contracts with Groundhog Solar LLC and 24 proposals to be accepted by June 12th. This event granted members of the co-op the chance to receive individualized proposals based on a group rate.

A committed member of the Indiana Co-Op, Jonathan Warnock's solar panels were finished being installed on May 5th. He stated that the opportunity presented by the Co-Op fiscally allowed him to fulfill a long-term goal to switch to solar energy. Although the panels were installed only about a month ago, Jonathan is already seeing the benefits of his switch. "Even today, where it's cloudy and rainy, we were generating more energy than we are using. We can see the credits that we're accumulating with Penelec."

Indiana County Riparian Restoration Efforts: 1,500 Native Trees Planted

The Western Pennsylvania Conservancy planted three riparian sites within Indiana County. The three sites, located in Center, East Mahoning, and Banks Townships, spanned a total of 7.5 acres. Across these sites, Indiana County volunteers planted a mixture of 1,500 native tree and shrub stems. Among the species planted were Redbuds, Swamp White Oaks, Black Willow, American Elderberry and Silky Dogwood, all of which thrive in riparian areas. Each planting event was coordinated and funded by the Indiana County Conservation District and the Ken Sink Trout Unlimited chapter. Rain Barrel Workshop

After months of preparation, Indiana Borough hosted a workshop on rain barrels and stormwater management at this year's May Mart. Borough staff members were tasked with writing grants to fund the workshop and produce educational materials to hand out. Additionally, borough staff members cleaned and assembled each of the 25 rain barrels that were given out free of charge at the workshop. The Stormwater Education Partnership obtained the barrels from a vendor called Rain Barrels of PA located in Jeanette, Pennsylvania. Kyle Mudry, the director of Communications and Grants at Indiana Borough, said that by utilizing rain barrels, the community can assist the Borough in addressing its stormwater issues by decreasing the amount of water going into our systems during intense rainfall events. Additionally, residents can also use the rainwater they collect for landscaping purposes, such as watering nonedible plants or washing vehicles.
